Hibiscus moscheutos 'Stardust'

If you live in a cold climate, you'll love the new hibiscus offerings from Monrovia's Fleming Hybrids collection: 'Stardust' (pictured here), 'Dave Fleming', and 'Strawberries & Cream'. 'Stardust' shows off striking pink blooms 10 to 12 inches in diameter with small red centers and vellow anthers. Green leaves are mottled with wine-colored accents. The compact, low-maintenance plant holds up to drought, wind, and wet conditions.

Lilium 'Pink Jazz'

Is it a forest or a flower? The towering 6-foot stems of 'Pink Jazz', which carry buckets of fragrant, bright pink blooms, are so stately and sturdy that a crowded bed of these lilies takes on the feel of an enchanted grove. This selection is the offspring of a cross between Oriental and trumpet lilies; it favors its trumpet parent in form, but is hardier and more heat resistant than either of its ancestors. Blooms in July and August.

Sun: Full sun in moderate climates: afternoon shade in hot climates.

Soil: Average Height: 6 feet Width: 12 inches

Zones: 6 to 10; colder with winter

Viola 'Heartthrob'

This enchanting violet from Terra Nova Nurseries packs a visual punch. Its heart-shaped leaves show off burgundy centers and deep green edges that will enliven the front of flower beds, containers, and garden paths. Small lavender flowers bloom in early spring, but you may not even notice, as the large, showy leaves will demand all of your attention.

wine and shadows

Paphiopedilum 'Nightshadow' is a Maudiae-type hybrid orchid created about five years ago from a cross between two Paphiopedilum cultivars: 'Ruby Leopard' and 'Laser'. 'Nightshadow' is a vinicolor, or wine-colored, hybrid, which means it has more pigment than others in its group. 'Nightshadow' blooms twice a year, and each set of flowers lasts two to three months.
